




# KRANTI DIWAS



# BLAST OFF TO NEW BEGINNINGS: MY FINAL YEAR AND THE ISRO EXPERIENCE

As Nathaniel Hawthorne puts it, time flies over us, but leaves its shadow behind. Over the past eight years, my experience as a Bhavanite has been a significant part of my life and shaped me in numerous ways. Now, it feels almost surreal to be writing this article as a student of Class X, knowing that my time here is drawing to a close. For me, the school has not only served as a centre for learning and social interactions, but as a second home. Walking through the corridors now, sitting in my classroom, I can't help but remember the first time I stepped into this school.

Over my school life, I have grown significantly – both academically and as a person. I have had the opportunity to learn a variety of subjects and explore my interests, developing critical thinking, problem solving, and communication skills along the way. I have participated in a variety of competitions, olympiads, quizzes, and more. Such experiences have played an important role in my academic development. Apart from academics, participating in cultural and co-curricular activities, collaborative projects, etc. has helped me in developing teamwork, leadership, and the ability to work with others. But even as I was doing all this, it never occurred to me that I was doing anything significantly formative. But now, I realize that these experiences have shaped me as an individual. As Dr. Seuss wrote, sometimes you will never know the value of a moment, until it becomes a memory

Among the many formative experiences I've had over the years, one recent opportunity stands out — a 15-day residential programme at an ISRO centre, the National Remote Sensing Centre in Hyderabad. In the Yuva Vigyani Karyakram (Young Scientist Programme, YuViKa), I received lectures from various scientists (including the team stationed at India's Bharati station in Antarctica), participated in various hands-on projects (such as model satellite making, rocket assembly, drone making, etc.), participated in group projects with other participants from across the country.

I also had the honour of interacting with several eminent personalities, such as Group Captain Angad Pratap (to-be astronaut in the Gaganyaan mission), Dr. Prakash Chauhan (Director, NRSC), and Dr. V. Narayanan (Chairperson, ISRO). We also had the opportunity of visiting two space-based startups, namely Dhruva Space (involved in satellite-production) and Skyroot Aerospace (involved in designing launch vehicles, and the developers of Vikram-S, India's first privately built rocket). Being a part of this initiative not only deepened my curiosity about science and space exploration but also showed me how the skills nurtured at school — from critical thinking to collaboration, from punctuality to speaking skills — are invaluable in real-world settings. This experience serves as a reminder that learning extends far beyond the classroom walls. It has broadened my horizons and inspired me to think more seriously about pursuing a future in the scientific or technological fields.

Now, as I step into my final year, my heart is full of nervousness and nostalgia, and perhaps a tinge of melancholia. I hope to make the most of my time this year, make memories with my friends and teachers, and most importantly, leave behind something meaningful, something inspirational for my juniors who will walk these corridors after me.

To my teachers — thank you for always guiding me and motivating me to do my best.

To my friends — thank you for the laughter, the debates, the shared deadlines, and all the moments in between.

To my juniors — make the most of every moment; it all goes by faster than you think.

This is but the end of the beginning. As this chapter closes, I look forward to the next – but a part of me will always remain here, in this school, and this school will always remain in me, in my heart. I hope that my time ahead will be as memorable as my time here.

  - 7. My yummy sandwich was ready!






# KOALA CLUB Glimpses of Bal mandir
